7.1 Board of Directors Report - Directors

Director Campbell reported that the Finance Committee met and reviewed the policy revisions that were previously approved.

Director Patterson reported that he attended the LAFCO meeting this morning and will have a request for a future agenda item later in the meeting.

7.2 Administrative Report - Chief Officers

The Administrative Report was included in the board packet and Chief Whittle reported on the following:

- E2511 was placed out of service due to significant brake wear. There was a delay in getting the replacement parts, which was resolved today.
- E2512 is going back to the Central shop to have the radiator repaired. There have been multiple problems with replacement radiator parts from an outside vendor. Central is handling the repairs and as of now will be warranting the work.

- Firefighters Matt Smith and Matt Smiley have successfully completed their probationary period. They will now progress into the SVFPD Engineer program.
- CICCS applications have been approved for BC Lofranco as a qualified Strike Team Leader, and Safety Officer Trainee. BC McNeil has been approved for Safety Officer Trainee as well.
- Captain Vandervoort and I met with the City of Scotts Valley City Manager, Community Development Director and Administrative Services Director regarding the current and future collection of fire fees. Currently the City collects some design and plan review fees for the SVFPD, and then issues the SVFPD payment once fees are collected. However, we have had difficulty reconciling the fees we charge with what the City sends us, therefore we are working on a solution that will work for both agencies.
- On October 2, a Type 3 Strike Team was sent to the KNP Complex Fire, resigned to the Alisal Fire in Santa Barbara and will likely return home on Friday. A new Strike Team may be requested shortly after they return.
- A task force from Santa Clara County was part of a preposition assignment due to the anticipated wind event and the number of Santa Cruz County engines assigned to the KNP Complex Fire.
- Thank you to Director Campbell for assisting Baymonte with his fire prevention expertise so they were able to complete their five-year fire sprinkler inspection.
- The LAFCO Countywide Services and Sphere Review for Fire Protection Services was approved today. Based on the LAFCO report, the SVFPD has one of the lowest ISO ratings, second fastest response time, reserves, financial stability but did recommend merging with the Branciforte Fire Protection District (BFPD).
- Administrative Captain Vandervoort has investigated a few suspicious fires recently.
- The Dominican Sisters are interested in getting back the Marywood Property, which appears that they make this request every 8-10 years. This will require some research and the options will be presented to the Board.
- For the BFPD, Administrative Staff completed a procedure manual and setup the computer, desk and office supplies. Since the Fire Chief was not appointed until September 16th, there was limited time for hands on training. The CAD response was returned to auto mutual aid as it was prior to the management agreement.

In conjunction with eliminating the PERS Choice and PERS Care plans, CalPERS announced it is merging both plans into a new "PERS Platinum" plan for 2022, with premium increases for the Bay Area region, as follows:

Any cash payment provided under this Side Letter shall be reported to the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") and California Franchise Tax Board as compensation subject to income tax withholding. Each employee shall be solely and personally responsible for calculations regarding PERS retirement benefits. If an employee is to discontinue their opt-out status due to a qualifying event, the alternative benefit contributions will terminate on the last complete pay period prior to being reintroduced to a District sponsored plan.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATION

LAFCO periodically performs municipal service reviews and sphere of influence updates for each agency subject to LAFCO's boundary regulations. As part of the Commission's Multi-Year Work Program, LAFCO staff has drafted a service and sphere review for the 13 local agencies that provide fire protection services, and scheduled a public hearing.

It is recommended that the Commission take the following actions:

- Find that pursuant to Section 15061(b)(3) of the State CEQA Guidelines, LAFCO determined that the service and sphere of influence review is not subject to the environmental impact evaluation process because it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment and the activity is not subject to CEQA;
- 2. Determine, pursuant to Government Code Section 56425, the Local Agency Formation Commission of Santa Cruz County is required to develop and determine a sphere of influence for the 13 affected agencies, and review and update, as necessary;
- 3. Determine, pursuant to Government Code Section 56430, the Local Agency Formation Commission of Santa Cruz County is required to conduct a service review before, or in conjunction with an action to establish or update a sphere of influence; and
- 4. Adopt a Resolution (LAFCO No. 2021-17) approving the 2021 Countywide Fire Protection Service and Sphere Review with the following terms and conditions:
 - a. Reaffirm the existing spheres of influence with no conditions for Aromas TCFPD, Central FD, City of Santa Cruz, and City of Watsonville;
 - b. Reaffirm the existing spheres of influence for Ben Lomond FPD, Boulder Creek FPD, Branciforte FPD, Felton FPD, Pajaro Valley FPD, Scotts Valley FPD, and Zayante FPD with the following condition: the fire protection districts shall coordinate with LAFCO to determine the affected district's future service area. These discussions should occur by August 2022. LAFCO will consider amending the sphere boundaries based on these discussions no later than December 2022;
 - c. Adopt a zero sphere of influence for County Service Area 4 as a precursor to dissolution;

- d. Adopt an amended sphere of influence for County Service Area 48 to eliminate the overlapping of spheres from other surrounding fire agencies; and
- e. Direct the Executive Officer to distribute a copy of the adopted service and sphere review to the 13 fire agencies, Monterey LAFCO, San Benito LAFCO, and any other interested or affected parties, including but not limited to the Civil Grand Jury of Santa Cruz County, County of Santa Cruz (Office of Emergency Services), Fire Department Advisory Commission of Santa Cruz County, Fire Safe Councils of Bonny Doon, Santa Cruz County, and South Skyline, and UC Santa Cruz (Office of Emergency Services).

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT:

State law requires LAFCO to periodically review and update the services and spheres of all cities and special districts. In accordance with the Commission's adopted Multi-Year Work Program, LAFCO staff has prepared a countywide service and sphere review (refer to **Attachment 1**) for the 13 local agencies that provide fire protection services, as shown below:

Key findings and recommendations are presented in the *Executive Summary* of the attached countywide fire report. The countywide report also includes *District Profile Chapters* which contain individual evaluations for each of the 13 local agencies - highlighting specific characteristics, ongoing operations, current fiscal health, existing governance structure, ability to provide services, and its importance within its jurisdictional area. The profiles conclude with statutory determinations required for all service and sphere of influence reviews pursuant to the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act.. This staff report summarizes the service and sphere review's findings.

Purpose & Key Findings

The goal of this analysis is to accomplish the Commission's direction to complete a service and sphere review for the District under the Multi-Year Work Program and fulfill the service and sphere determinations under the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act. The following are the main conclusions of the report:

Aromas Tri-County Fire Protection District

1. The District provides services in three different counties.

Aromas Tri-County FPD has been providing fire protection services to three different counties through a contract with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (Cal FIRE) for the past 28 years. Monterey LAFCO is, and continues to be, the "Principal LAFCO," which has direct purview of the District. This designation is based on assessed value. At present, approximately 7 square miles are located in Santa Cruz County out of the District's 40 square mile service area.

2. The District provides services from one fire station.

The station, which was built in 1979, is located in Monterey County (392 Carpenteria Road, Aromas CA). The station is staffed with a daily minimum of a 3-person company consisting of 1 battalion chief, 1 fire captain, and 1 apparatus engineer. Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state standards regarding firefighters on duty but it does not meet the national standards.

3. The District is financially sound.

Aromas Tri-County FPD has ended with an annual surplus in the last five years. As of June 30, 2019, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$2 million. LAFCO staff believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current strategic partnership with Cal FIRE.

4. The District has a multi-county sphere.

Monterey LAFCO, as the principal LAFCO, has adopted a multi-county sphere of influence for the District. The District's multi-county sphere of influence is generally coterminous with its jurisdictional boundary. In addition to this multi-county sphere, Santa Cruz LAFCO also adopted a sphere of influence for ATCFPD within Santa Cruz County originally in March 1989. The sphere boundary within Santa Cruz County is coterminous with the District's service area and has remained unchanged. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

Ben Lomond Fire Protection District

1. The District provides services to a small community.

Ben Lomond FPD currently provides fire protection services to the unincorporated community of Ben Lomond through one fire station. It currently operates with one full-time employee, one part-time employee, and 30 volunteer firefighters. As of August 2021, the District has one staff member on duty from Monday to Friday from 8:00am to 4:00pm. Based on staff's analysis, the District does not meet the state or national standards regarding firefighters on duty.

2. The District is financially stable.

Ben Lomond FPD has ended with an annual surplus in the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$2.3 million. LAFCO believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current management practices.

3. The District has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted BLFPD's original sphere of influence on September 1, 1976, which included areas beyond the District's jurisdictional boundary. In January 2008 and subsequently in November 2016, the Commission reaffirmed this sphere boundary. Staff

is recommending that the current sphere of influence be reaffirmed as part of this report. However, LAFCO encourages the District to coordinate with CSA 48 and LAFCO to determine BLFPD's future service area. Based on these discussions, LAFCO may consider amending the sphere boundary by December 2022.

Boulder Creek Fire Protection District

1. The District provides services to a small community.

Boulder Creek FPD currently provides fire protection services to the unincorporated community of Boulder Creek through one fire station. It currently operates with one full-time employee, one part-time employee, and 43 volunteer firefighters. As of August 2021, the District has one staff member on duty at all times (365 days a year/24 hours a day). Based on staff's analysis, the District does not meet the state or national standards regarding firefighters on duty.

2. The District is financially stable.

Boulder Creek FPD has ended with an annual surplus in four of the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$1.5 million. LAFCO believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current management practices.

3. The District has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted BCFPD's original sphere of influence on March 10, 1994, which included areas beyond the District's jurisdictional boundary. In January 2008 and subsequently in November 2016, the Commission reaffirmed this sphere boundary. Staff is recommending that the current sphere of influence be reaffirmed as part of this report. However, LAFCO encourages the District to coordinate with CSA 48 and LAFCO to determine BCFPD's future service area. Based on these discussions, LAFCO may consider amending the sphere boundary by December 2022.

Branciforte Fire Protection District

1. The District provides services to a small community.

Branciforte FPD currently provides fire protection services to the unincorporated community of Branciforte through one fire station. It currently operates with three full-time employees and 13 volunteer firefighters. The station is staffed with one captain 24 hours a day. Based on staff's analysis, the District does not meet the state or national standards regarding firefighters on duty.

2. The District does not have an official fire chief or administrative staff.

Branciforte FPD currently provides fire protection services to the unincorporated community of Branciforte. It currently operates with three full-time employees and 13 volunteer firefighters. However, the District does not have any administrative staff, including no Fire Chief. Since September 2015, Branciforte FPD has relied heavily on Scotts Valley FPD to provide all administrative and command services under an existing contract. Under this agreement, the Scotts Valley FPD Fire Chief also functions as the Fire Chief for BFPD. This contract expired on September 30, 2021. The Board recently hired a retired CalFire employee on September 16 as a part-time Fire Chief. LAFCO staff is significantly concerned that the part-time employee will not have the time and resources to complete all the administrative services fulfilled by SVFPD. At present, the District has no other admin staff or a strategic plan on how to address all daily, monthly, annual and statutory responsibilities previously fulfilled by SVFPD.

3. The District is financially stable.

Branciforte FPD has ended with an annual surplus in the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$948,000. LAFCO believes that this positive trend was the direct result of existing contract between BFPD and Scotts Valley FPD. Under this agreement, Scotts Valley FPD has been managing all internal operations, including the budgetary practices on behalf of BFPD. This positive trend may discontinue following the contract's September 2021 sunset date.

4. The District has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted BFPD's combined sphere of influence on March 10, 1994, which included areas beyond the District's jurisdictional boundary. This sphere determination indicated that BFPD and Scotts Valley FPD should be merged or consolidated in the foreseeable future. LAFCO staff believes that the merger concept should be considered by BFPD and its residents to ensure the level of service remains the same or improve as a result of the proposed reorganization. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

Central Fire District

1. The District is a result of a recent consolidation.

CFD is a result of a multi-year effort to consolidate two fire agencies: Aptos/La Selva and Central Fire Protection Districts. This consolidation was able to preserve the current levels of service, maintain local demand expectations, and continue the existing funding sources while maximizing economies of scale, combining best practices, and ultimately lead to cost-savings. Today, CFD encompasses 55 square miles of territory and includes the City of Capitola and the unincorporated communities of Live Oak, Soquel, Aptos, Rio Del Mar, and La Selva Beach.

2. The District provides services to various communities.

CFD currently provides fire protection services to a large portion of the county through 7 fire stations. It currently operates with 101 full-time employees, 1-part time employee, 3 seasonal personnel, and 10 volunteer firefighters. All stations are staffed with a minimum of a 3-person crew. Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state or national standards regarding firefighters on duty.

3. The District is expected to be financially sound.

CFD is expected to have an annual surplus each year starting in FY 2022-23. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$29 million. LAFCO believes that the anticipated positive trend may continue going forward under the current management practices.

4. The District has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted CFD's sphere of influence on November 4, 2020 as a result of the consolidation involving Aptos/La Selva and Central FPDs. The sphere goes beyond the District's existing jurisdictional boundary indicating that those areas should be annexed into the District in the foreseeable future. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

County Service Area 4 (Pajaro Dunes)

1. The District is a dependent special district of Santa Cruz County.

CSA 4 is a dependent special district governed by the County Board of Supervisors. All CSAs are formed and operate pursuant to the County Service Area Law (Government Code Section 25210 et seq.). Santa Cruz County currently contracts with Cal FIRE for the administration of CSA 4 including operational oversight and supervision of all career and volunteer firefighters.

2. The District provides services from one fire station.

The station is located at 2661 Beach Road in Watsonville. The station's staffing varies with a 3-person company consisting of 1 battalion chief, 1 fire captain, and 1 apparatus engineer 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to all volunteer firefighters. Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state standards regarding firefighters on duty but it does not meet the national standards.

3. The District is financially stable.

CSA 4 has ended with an annual surplus in the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$944,000. LAFCO believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current strategic partnership with CAL FIRE.

4. The District has a coterminous sphere.

LAFCO originally adopted a coterminous sphere of influence for the District on March 1, 1989. A coterminous sphere is identical to the agency's jurisdictional boundary. For the past 32 years, the sphere boundary has remained unchanged. LAFCO staff is recommending a zero sphere designation. A "zero" sphere of influence indicates that the district should be dissolved, and fire responsibilities should be transferred to another local agency. LAFCO believes that CSA 4 should be dissolved and concurrently annexed into CSA 48. The County may create a zone of benefit to ensure that the collected funds remain within the Pajaro Dunes community.

County Service Area 48 (County Fire)

1. The District is a dependent special district of Santa Cruz County.

CSA 48 is a dependent special district governed by the County Board of Supervisors. All CSAs are formed and operate pursuant to the County Service Area Law (Government Code Section 25210 et seq.). Santa Cruz County currently contracts with Cal FIRE for the administration of CSA 48 including operational oversight and supervision of all career and volunteer firefighters.

2. The District provides services to all areas outside a fire agency.

Approximately 43% of the entire county is unincorporated lands outside a fire district or city that provides fire protection. That is why the County formed CSA 48 to protect those residents. CSA 48 currently operates 15 fire stations. Staffing within each station varies with a 3-person company consisting of 1 battalion chief, 1 fire captain, and 1 apparatus engineer 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to all volunteer firefighters. Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state standards regarding firefighters on duty but it does not meet the national standards.

3. The District has financial constraints.

CSA 48 has ended with an annual surplus in five of the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$6.2 million. LAFCO believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current strategic partnership with CAL FIRE.

4. The District has a multi-county sphere.

LAFCO originally adopted a sphere of influence for the District on October 16, 1985 as part of its formation. The original sphere included areas beyond CSA 48's jurisdictional boundary. The 1985 resolution included language that stated, "Annexations to fire districts and cities with municipal fire departments shall be accompanied by detachments from this county service area." For the past 36 years, areas have been detached from CSA 48 and annexed into the other fire agencies. Additionally, CSA 48's existing sphere of influence overlaps with other fire agencies – causing confusion on which entity is the most logical service provider. Therefore, staff is recommending that CSA 48's sphere be modified to remove all overlapping areas.

Felton Fire Protection District

1. The District provides services to a small community.

Felton FPD currently provides fire protection services to the Felton community through one fire station. It currently operates with 1 full-time employee, 1 part-time employee, and 28 volunteer firefighters. The station is staffed with 1 firefighter during regular business hours (Monday to Friday). Based on staff's analysis, the District does not meet the state or national standards regarding firefighters on duty.

2. The District is financially stable.

Felton FPD has ended with an annual surplus in five of the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$2 million. LAFCO believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current management practices.

3. The District has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO originally adopted a sphere of influence for FFPD on March 10, 1994. The sphere goes beyond FFPD's current jurisdictional boundary, indicating that these areas should be annexed into the District in the foreseeable future. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

Pajaro Valley Fire Protection Distric

1. The District provides services to various communities.

Pajaro Valley FPD has been providing fire protection services to a populated area in the southern portion of the county through a contract with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (Cal FIRE) for the past 24 years. The station is staffed with a daily minimum of a 3-person company consisting of 1 battalion chief, 1 fire captain, and 1 apparatus engineer (24 hours a day). Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state standards regarding firefighters on duty but it does not meet the national standards.

2. The District is financially stable.

Pajaro Valley FPD has ended with an annual surplus in five of the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$1.5 million.

LAFCO believes that the overall positive trend may continue going forward under the current strategic partnership with Cal FIRE.

3. The District has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted PVFPD's sphere of influence on June 7, 1995 as a result of the consolidation involving Freedom and Salsipuedes FPDs. The sphere goes beyond the District's existing jurisdictional boundary indicating that those areas should be annexed into the District in the foreseeable future. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

Santa Cruz City Fire Department

1. The City has its own fire department.

The City of Santa Cruz was incorporated in 1866 and now operates as a charter city. Santa Cruz provides a variety of municipal services, including fire protection under the City's Fire Department (SCCFD). The City currently operates four fire stations. The stations are staffed with a minimum of 3-person company. Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state standards regarding firefighters on duty but it does not meet the national standards.

2. The Department has financial constraints.

SCCFD has ended with an annual deficit during the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the City is operating with a net position of approximately \$54 million. LAFCO believes that this negative trend will continue unless total revenue is increased in order to cover annual costs.

3. The City has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted the City's original sphere of influence on August 3, 1983. In January 2019, the Commission amended the City's sphere to include 3 nautical miles offshore to reflect the city's legal limits. The sphere goes beyond the City's current jurisdictional boundary, indicating that these areas should be annexed in the foreseeable future. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

Scotts Valley Fire Protection District

1. The District provides services to various communities.

Scotts Valley FPD currently provides fire protection services to the City of Scotts Valley and its surrounding areas including the Branciforte community. It currently operates with 22 full-time firefighters, 3 full-time Battalion Chiefs, 1 full-time Fire Chief, 2 full-time and 1-part time administrative personnel, with 15 volunteer firefighters. In addition to their internal operations, Scotts Valley FPD has been providing administrative and command services to BFPD under an existing contract since 2015. The District currently operates two fire stations. Station 1 is staffed with 4.5 administrative personnel during regular business hours and 5 firefighters 24 hours a day. Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state standards regarding firefighters on duty but it does not meet the national standards.

2. The District is financially stable.

Scotts Valley FPD has ended with an annual surplus in five of the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$3 million. LAFCO believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current management practices.

3. The District has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted SVFPD's combined sphere of influence on March 10, 1994, which included areas beyond the District's jurisdictional boundary. This sphere determination indicated that BFPD and Scotts Valley FPD should be merged or consolidated in the foreseeable future. LAFCO staff believes that the merger concept should be considered by Scotts Valley FPD. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

Watsonville City Fire Department

1. The City has its own fire department.

The City of Watsonville was incorporated in 1868 and now operates as a charter city. Watsonville provides a variety of municipal services, including fire protection under the City's Fire Department (WCFD). The City currently operates two fire stations. Station 1 is staffed by a minimum of 6 fire suppression personnel and one battalion chief. Station 2 is staffed by a minimum of 3 fire suppression personnel. Both stations are staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state and national standards regarding firefighters on duty.

2. The Department is financially stable.

WCFD has ended with an annual surplus in five of the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the City is operating with a net position of approximately \$39 million. LAFCO believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current management practices.

3. The City has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted the City's original sphere of influence on January 12, 1983. The sphere has been amended to reflect the approved annexations that have occurred throughout the years. The sphere goes beyond the City's current jurisdictional boundary, indicating that these areas should be annexed in the foreseeable future. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

Zayante Fire Protection District

1. The District provides services to a small community.

Zayante FPD currently provides fire protection services to the Zayante community through three fire stations. It currently operates with 3 full-time firefighters, 2 part-time employees, and 22 volunteer firefighters. Station 1 is staffed with a 3-person crew at minimum during regular business hours (Monday to Friday from 8:00am to 5:00pm). Based on staff's analysis, the District meets the state standards regarding firefighters on duty but it does not meet the national standards.

2. The District is financially stable.

Zayante FPD has ended with an annual surplus in five of the last six years. As of June 30, 2020, the District is operating with a net position of approximately \$671,000. LAFCO believes that this positive trend may continue going forward under the current management practices.

3. The District has a sphere expanding beyond its service area.

Santa Cruz LAFCO adopted ZFPD's original sphere of influence on March 10, 1994, which included areas beyond the District's jurisdictional boundary. The sphere also indicates that certain areas should be detached and annexed into surrounding agencies. It may be beneficial for ZFPD and LAFCO to discuss the current sphere and determine how to address these areas. LAFCO staff recommends reaffirming the existing sphere boundary.

Environmental Review

LAFCO staff has conducted an environmental review for the draft service and sphere review in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Staff has determined that the service and sphere review is exempt because it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, and the activity is not subject to CEQA (Section 15061[b][3]). A Notice of Exemption, as shown in **Attachment 2**, was recorded on September 13, 2021.

Coordination Step

LAFCO encourages transparency and strategic partnerships among local agencies. That is why staff reached out to various affected and interested agencies regarding the countywide fire report at the beginning of the year. A survey was sent to the 13 agencies as well as other fire entities in order to receive necessary data and feedback to conduct staff's analysis. The other fire entities included (a) Fire Safe Councils of Bonny Doon, Santa Cruz County, (b) Office of Emergency Services of Santa Cruz County and UC Santa Cruz, (c) Fire Department Advisory Commission of Santa Cruz County, (d) Resource Conservation District of Santa Cruz County, and (e) Santa Cruz County Civil Grand Jury. Those interested in receiving regular updates from LAFCO were kept up-todate on LAFCO's progress. Staff would like to thank the interested agencies for their time and effort in assisting LAFCO in completing this state mandate.

Agency Review and Public Notice

A hearing notice for this draft service and sphere review was published in the September 8th issue of the Santa Cruz Sentinel (Attachment 3). An administrative draft of the report was also shared with the Districts' fire chiefs. This allowed all 13 local agencies an opportunity to review LAFCO staff's findings and provide feedback a month before the report was finalized. Edits received were implemented in the report to ensure accuracy in staff's evaluation. Staff would like to thank each fire chief and their staff for their time and effort in helping fulfill this state mandate. Based on the analysis shown in the countywide fire report (refer to Attachment 1), coupled with the fact that all 13 local agencies had an opportunity to review the report's findings, staff is recommending that the Commission adopt the attached resolution (refer to Attachment 4) approving the countywide service and sphere review.

ORDINANCE NO 2021-1

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A SCHEDULE OF FEES FOR INSPECTION SERVICES, PLAN CHECKS, PERMITS, COST RECOVERY, AND OTHER FIRE SERVICE RELATED FEES

WHEREAS, the California Health and Safety Code, Section 13916, authorizes the Board of Directors of the Scotts Valley Fire Protection District (SVFPD) to charge a fee to cover the cost of any service which the SVFPD provides, or for the cost of enforcing any regulation for which a fee is charged;

WHEREAS, the following fees reflect the actual cost borne by the SVFPD in providing the service or enforcing the regulation;

WHEREAS, the current fee schedule is in need of revision and update;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED THAT, the SVFPD adopts the schedule of fees attached as the current Fire Prevention and Fire Service Fees;

FUTHER BE RESOLVED AND ORDERED THAT, this Ordinance rescinds Ordinance 2005-2 and any other previous Fee Schedule Ordinances.

Fee Schedule

A fee in accordance with the following schedule shall be paid to the SVFPD at the time of application or upon receipt of an invoice for services rendered for:

Inspection Service

When a fire inspection is requested or required by state or local ordinance, the standard hourly fee shall be charged. This fee is one hundred fifty-eight dollars (\$158) per hour with a one hour minimum for each inspection and staff member. After the first hour, seventy-nine dollars (\$79.00) per half hour shall be charged with a one-half hour minimum. The fee is for actual office hours and field hours per project/inspection.

Such fee shall not be refunded upon failure of an applicant to obtain necessary permits. Failure to apply for necessary permits or services may result in an order from the Fire Chief or their designee to obtain a permit for service.

Plan Review Service/Required Permits

When a plan review is requested or required by state or local ordinance under any of the following categories, the standard hourly fee shall be charged for actual office hours and field hours per project review. Included are fire alarm, sprinkler system and fixed extinguishing system required permits, and other plans as required.

Building Plan Review including commercial and residential construction. The total fee due prior to a building permit being issued is determined by the size of the project. Inclusive in these fees are office time, field inspection time and phone consultation time. Square footage calculations are computed on total floor area which includes all floors, heated and unheated, porches, and garages. Plan review and site visits (inspections) are included in the permit price.

Meeting Room Facility Fees are required to be paid in advance of the use of the facility. Charges for damages or other loss will be charged at actual cost for repairs plus an administrative fee.

HOURLY EQUIPMENT AND PERSONNEL FEES

The SVFPD will seek cost recovery for the following types of incidents:

- 1. Hazardous materials releases
- 2. Flagrant false alarms
- 3. Incident involving illegal activities
- 4. Incident resulting from negligence

The following components will be factored into the recovery charge:

- 1. Personnel costs
- 2. Mobile equipment costs
- 3. Tools, materials and supply costs
- 4. Dispatch and communications cost
- 5. Specialty equipment

Recovery costs will be based on actual cost to provide the service plus a 20% administrative fee.

Personnel

Personnel costs will be calculated utilizing a "fully loaded" actual cost. The hourly rate will include actual salary and benefit costs based on the position and the current memorandum of understanding. Overtime premium will be charged based on actual personnel response and/or required cover.

Mobile Equipment

Mobile equipment will be charged at the current OES/FEMA schedule of hourly equipment rates plus mileage with a \$50.00 minimum charge. All other equipment will be charged at actual cost.

Materials and Supply Costs

Materials and supplies will be charged at the actual cost of replacement including tax and freight.

Dispatch and Communications Costs

The cost of dispatch will be actual cost as determined by the SVFPD agreement with Santa Cruz Consolidated Emergency Communications Center. Other telecommunication charges will be billed based on actual costs.

Waiver of Fees

Any request for the waiver of fees will be presented to the SVFPD Board of Directors in writing and agendized for the next regular Board meeting. A majority vote of the Board is required to waive fees.

This Ordinance shall become effective sixty (60) days after passage of the Board of Directors. This Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect until a subsequent superseding Ordinance becomes effective.

Recommendation

Discussion

In January 2013, the Scotts Valley Water District approached the Scotts Valley Fire District regarding the feasibility of securing an easement on the District owned property on La Madrona Drive. At the time, the District had not made any final decisions on whether to pursue funding for a fire station, or sell to the property on the open market.

After discussions, the Board of Directors approved the adoption of proposed easement as presented at the April 10, 2013 regular Board meeting.

In October of 2013, it was reported that the easement documents for the La Madrona Intertie Project had not been recorded. The grant funding was reduced, and it appeared that the La Madrona Intertie Project had been eliminated. The Board discussed pulling the easement documents since the contract was not fulfilled and would consider future proposals for the project.

At a Special Meeting of the Board of Directors on October 30, 2013, the Board unanimously voted to submit a letter to the Scotts Valley Water District to return the signed easement documents for not fulfilling the Intertie Project contract and submit future Intertie Project Plans to the SVFPD for consideration.

The Scotts Valley Water District is once again in a position to secure grant funding for this Intertie Project. They are asking the Board to consider discussing an easement agreement.

Recommendation

Direct staff to proceed by having the project engineers prepare a legal description of the easements and plat map along with obtaining an appraisal for the proposed easements for further Board consideration.

Discussion

The Scotts Valley Water District secured 50% grant funding to construct an emergency pipeline intertie with the Santa Cruz City water system for the transfer of water during emergencies. The project is estimated at \$2.4 million. The new pipeline would connect to the Santa Cruz water system near the end of Sims Road where it joins La Madrona Drive. The pipeline would then follow La Madrona Drive to join the Scotts Valley Water District system at Silverwood Drive near our La Madrona Fire Station Site. The project engineers have identified the southern portion of our La Madrona Fire Station Site as the ideal location for a booster pump and intertie station and have prepared a site plan with proposed easements (attached). The project is also proposing a temporary construction easement of the entire parcel for use as a construction staging area during construction of the intertie.

Staff proposed the addition of five fire hydrants along the developed portions of the La Madrona Drive pipeline and they have been incorporated into the project.

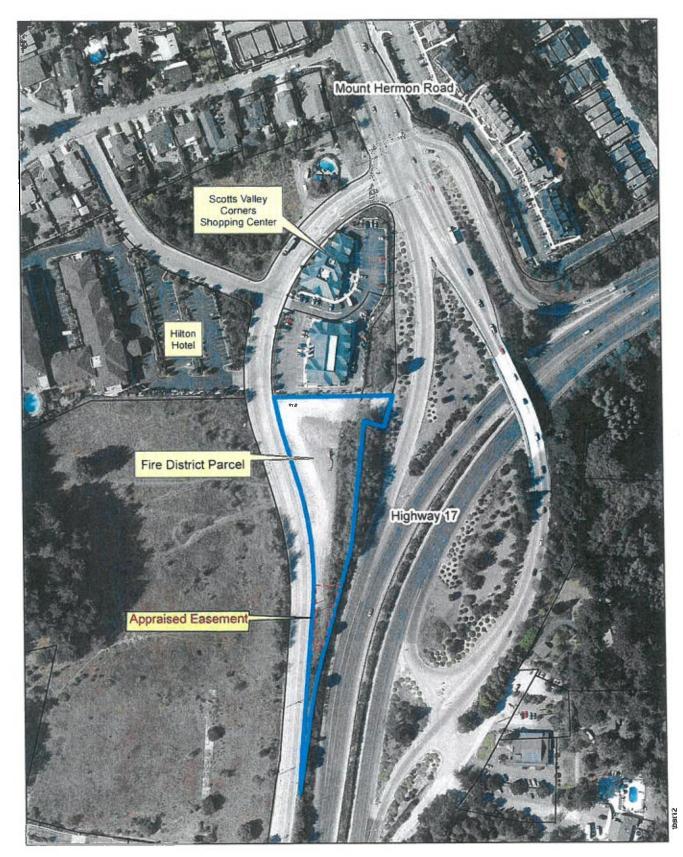

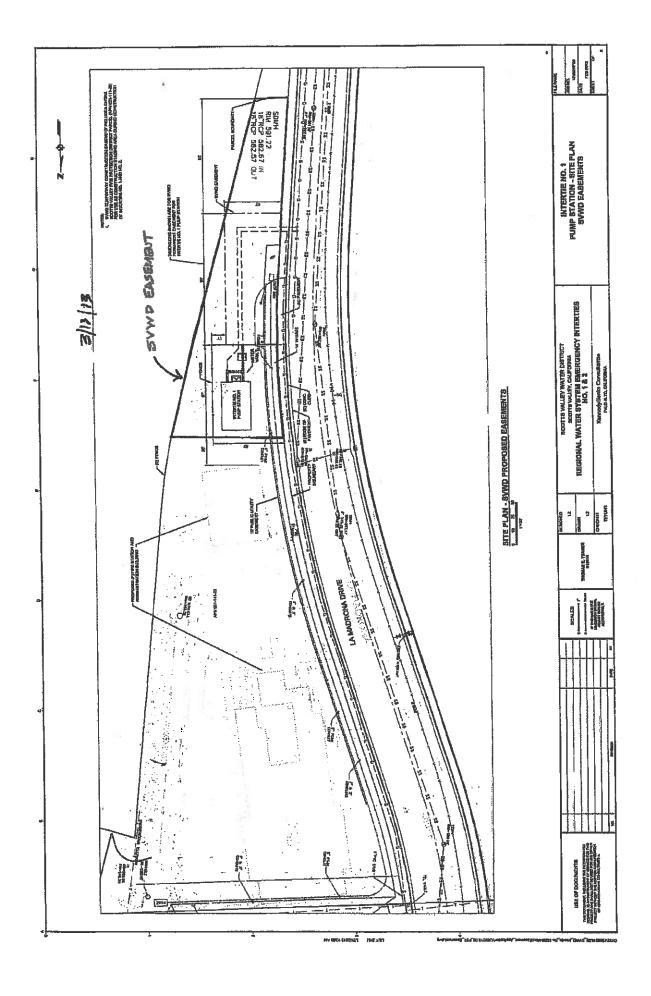

The pump station is sited 20 feet back from the street to re- flect a 20' building setback requirement stated in the zoning ordinance. The pump station will be served by two under- ground 12-inch water pipelines. In the south, most narrow portion of the easement, these pipelines will run parallel to the street about 60 feet, then turn 90 degrees west to the street. This orientation allows the pipelines to avoid the existing un- derground PG&E and CATV easements. |

The location might support a 20-foot deep building, or perhaps 5 to 6 parking spaces, but if the site is rezoned for office/retail use, this is some distance from the main developable part of the property and is the least desirable portion of the development envelope. To the south of this 3,300 square foot pump station site, the rest of the easement (containing the underground pipelines) is too narrow to be unusable for any development and contributes no value to the fire station property. |

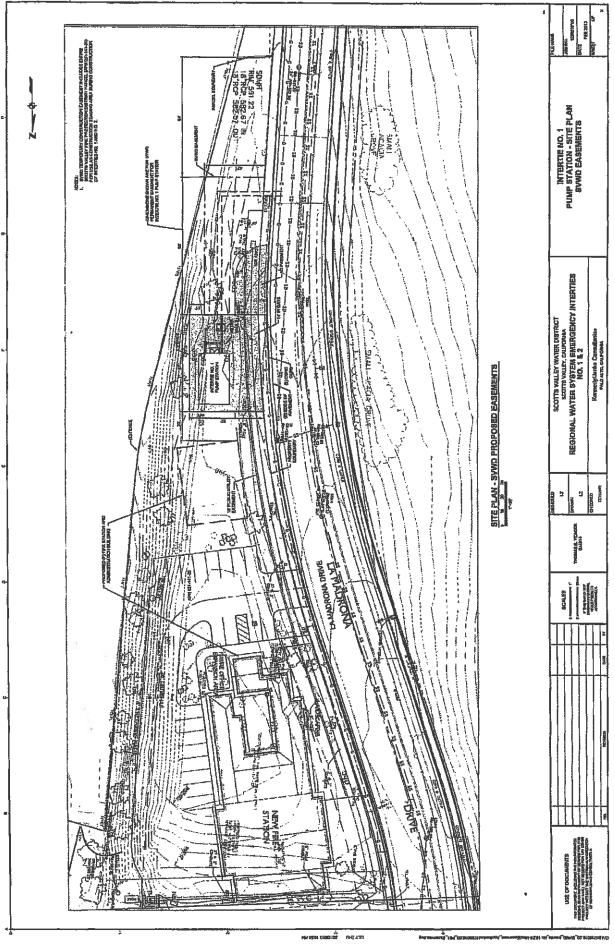

5. Action Items

5.1 <u>Use of the La Madrona Fire Station Site for an Intertie Pump Station –</u> <u>Discussion/Action</u>

Chief Grebil stated that the Scotts Valley Water District secured 50% grant funding to construct an emergency pipeline intertie with the Santa Cruz City water system for the transfer of water during emergencies. The project is also proposing a temporary construction easement of the entire parcel for use as a construction staging area during construction of the intertie.

Staff proposed the addition of five fire hydrants along the developed portions of the La Madrona Drive pipeline and they have been incorporated into the project.

The recommendation was to direct staff to proceed by having the project engineers prepare a legal description of the easements and plat map along with obtaining an appraisal for the proposed easements for further Board consideration.

Director Alan Smith inquired if the structure would be above ground and wanted clarification on if the district would be donating the property to the Water District.

President Art Smith questioned if the pump station would be clear of the new fire station and how the structure would affect the future sale of the property. He would like to see a fire station built at some point and would like to preserve as much of the property as possible.

Director Armstrong wanted to know why the pump station couldn't be moved more towards Silverwood Drive. She feels that the sale of the property is more likely to happen than building a new station and wondered how this would affect the future.

Director Warren asked about noise from the pump because he did not want it to be an issue for the crew quarters. He stated that the addition of the pump station would lower the property value.

Director Cabigas wondered why the Water District couldn't put the pump station across the street. He inquired if there was anything that could be negotiated with the Water District or with the City of Scotts Valley for allowing the pump station to be built on SVFD property.

Chief Grebil reported that the pump station would be an above ground structure. There is an issue with overhead power lines and the engineer said that this is the furthest south that the pump station will work on this piece of property. Scotts Valley Fire District would not be donating the property to the Water District. Chief Grebil stated that he took on this project because of the benefits of emergency water and the addition of five fire hydrants to the district.

On motion of Director Armstrong seconded by Director Alan Smith to Direct Staff to Proceed by having the Project Engineers Prepare a Legal Description of the Easements and Plot Map Along with obtaining an Appraisal for the Proposed Easements for Further Board Consideration was approved by the following unanimous vote:

6. Action Items

6.1 <u>Use of the La Madrona Fire Station Site for an Intertie Pump Station</u> – Discussion/Action

Chief Grebil stated that at the March Board Meeting, Staff presented the Scotts Valley Water District's (SVWD) proposal to secure easements of the La Madrona Fire Station Site for a booster pump and intertie station. Direction was given to Staff to have the project engineers prepare a legal description of the easements and plot map along with obtaining an appraisal for the proposed easement for further Board consideration. Chief Grebil stated that representatives from the SVWD along with their Project Engineers are in attendance this evening to answer questions.

Director Cabigas stated that he and Director Armstrong walked the proposed site with representatives from the SVWD to discuss concerns they had with the project including the proposed pump station location. Director Cabigas stated that due to their meeting at the site, the SVWD was able to move the proposed pump station an additional 10 feet further south.

Director Warren inquired about the contract including language for a process to resolve future issues that may include noise, exhaust or other problems that may arise due to the pump station.

Mr. Robert DeLoach, SVWD Interim General Manager, addressed the Board to discuss the benefits of the Emergency Water Intertie Project (Project). Mr. DeLoach reported that the SVWD is in the process of securing the 6.9 million dollars in grant funding available for the Project and without the grant funding, the Project would not be possible. The grant paperwork must be submitted by May 15th so timing is extremely important. The easement and plot map has been completed but it will be four to six

weeks before the appraisal can be completed. The request to the Board is to approve the easement and plot map pending final approval of the contract after the appraisal has been completed.

Mr. Rick Rogers, San Lorenzo Valley Water District General Manager and Boulder Creek Fire District Board Director, addressed the Board regarding the importance of the Project. In May 2012, the well behind the Probation Center failed. Due to the failure, there was a two week water shortage with no water for fire protection in that area. If the emergency intertie was in place, there would have been no water shortage. The Project will tie the SLVWD, SVWD and the Santa Cruz Water Department (SCWD) together to provide mutual aid water for emergencies similar to the way the mutual aid system is used in the Fire Service.

Mr. John Rayner, Engineer with Kennedy/Jenks Consultants, reviewed the Project. The Project proposes to construct six emergency interties to connect the SVWD, SLVWD and the SCWD. The interties would consist of 8 to 12 inch pipelines that would primarily be located within existing rights-of-ways and concrete masonry unit pump stations. These pipelines and pump stations would allow the transfer of water in the event of an unforeseen emergency. The La Madrona lot was selected as the ideal location for the pump station for Intertie number one. As part of the Project, five hydrants will be added along La Madrona Drive, which will benefit the SVFPD and residents. The request is also for a temporary easement to use the entire property for staging during construction, which will be approximately ten to twelve months. The pump station will be a concrete building and the noise study revealed no signification noise issues. The outside look of the pump station can be changed to match the area. All property must be approved before the grant is signed so it is important to receive approval for the easements. The request to the Board is to approve both the temporary and permanent easement subject to the SVWD obtaining an appraisal, paying the appraised amount and finalizing the legal contract.

Operations

E2511 was placed back into service after the rear brake system was replaced which included new shoes, drums, and seals. The engine was also completely serviced and received an annual inspection by the mechanic performing the work.

On 10/9/21 E2538, E2537, along with units from Santa Cruz City, Cal Fire, Central Fire, and Branciforte Fire responded to a wildland fire behind 816 North Plymouth St. Crews encountered an approximate 1 acre fire in steep heavy vegetation terrain. Crews were able to knock down the fire quickly and stop the threat to the structures above on North Plymouth. The following morning on 10/10/21 a small wildland fire occurred on Graham Hill Rd across from the probation center in the Henry Cowell Park. Two separate fires were quickly extinguished. The cause of both fires were undetermined but were suspicious in nature. Cal Fire Prevention Officers are doing further investigations into fires.

On 10/15/21 E2537 responded to the Estrada Fire near Mt. Madonna Rd and Hazel Dell Rd. A controlled burn on private property escaped and started burning into heavy vegetation. E2537 remained on scene until the evening. The following morning, E2537 staffed by Captain Grigg, Eng. Green, Eng. Post and PCF Pisciotta responded as part of an ABH Task Force led by BC McNeil back to the Estrada Fire. E2537 worked a 24 hour shift before being released.

On the same evening E2538 was dispatched to a wildland fire in Pogonip Park. Crews found the fire in a steep drainage with heavy brush. Due to the difficult location and limited access crews worked throughout the evening and into the next afternoon to fully extinguish the fire. 4 firefighters were injured at the fire, one from SVFD. All injuries were minor and the SVFD employee has since returned to work. The cause of the fire was determined to be an unattended camp fire.

On the evening 10/16/21 E2538 and B2501 responded again to Pogonip Park for another wildland fire in a different section of the park. 2 fires were burning in separate locations. E2538 assisted engines from Santa Cruz City and Cal Fire on one of the fires while B2501 provided overhead support for the Santa Cruz incident commander. E2538 and B2501 were on scene for a couple of hours. The cause of the fire remains under investigation by Santa Cruz City due to the suspicious nature and location of the starts.

A new incident and occupancy software called Emergency Reporting has been purchased to replace Firehouse Incident Reporting Software. The software is up and running and is being built out. Training for administrators is happening the first week of November followed by training for staff and company officers in late November/early December. The software is scheduled to go live January 1, 2022.

On October 2, E2538 staffed by Captain Petteys, Eng Crivello, Eng Nehf and FF Shaughnessy along with BC LoFranco as the STEN, responded as part of a Type 3 Strike Team to the KNP Complex in Sequoia National Park. The crews were assigned 12 hours shifts, and all went well. On October 12th, they were reassigned to the Alisal Fire in Santa Barbara County, and returned home on Friday October 15th.

Training

FF Shaughnessy has completed his County paramedic accreditation program. Engineers Pedemonte, Cahir, and Post did a great job working with FF Shaughnessy during the accreditation process.

The SCHMIT quarterly training was held at Zayante Fire station. The training was conducted by RW Jones & Associates.

ENG Pedemonte has started his Acting Captain task book, and is about halfway through the program and doing very well.

<u>EMS</u>

Engineer Paramedic Cahir is working with other members on the EMSIA on a new advanced airway for all agencies including BLS departments. The new airway is called the I-GeI and is easier and less invasive then the current King Tube.

- BC McNeil and I met with Dale Hendsbee, the structural engineer at Mesiti-Miller Engineering to discuss seismic upgrades for station one. We reviewed the Tier 1 structural report and toured the fire station. We also had a follow up meeting with another one of their engineers, and they are putting together a proposal for a more in-depth report to include testing, and making recommendations for completing repairs and upgrades to the facility.
- I attended the regular LAFCO meeting on October 13. Executive Director Serrano presented the Countywide Service and Sphere Review for Fire Protection Services report to the LAFCO commission. The Summary of Recommendations is contained in the Board packet. The full report is available for review on the LAFCO web site.
- I attended my first meeting as part of the Santa Cruz County Treasury Oversight Commission. I am the alternate for Special Districts. The role of the Commission is to provide oversight that the County Auditor-Controller is in compliance with County and State investment laws, by reviewing quarterly financial reports and other financial information provided to the Commission.

- I attended the Special Board meeting on October 7th. At the Boards direction, I contacted LCW to draft side letter for all bargaining units regarding the change in health care premiums and plans for 2022.
- I also met with LCW regarding the Marywood property and have not received a report back.
- We are looking into acquiring a used Bauer SCBA compressor from Cal Fire. They recently replaced one of their units, and have offered us the unit they removed from the station. BC LoFranco has inspected the unit, and it is in excellent condition. The unit is currently set up for 4500 psi filling, we would need to upgrade it to 5500 psi. We have been in contact with Bauer Compressors, they are working on providing us with a quote to upgrade the unit from 4500 psi to 5500 psi. We had originally planned to upgrade our compressor this year with a new unit, budgeted at \$70,000. We should be able to put this used unit in service for under \$10,000, saving the District approximately \$60,000. We are waiting on Cal Fire to provide details of the acquisition before we proceed.
